Having completed this survey, I now have a better understanding of things I personally could improve in when it comes to taking care of the environment.

I hope to:

- Complete a personal carbon footprint audit
- Switch to purchasing Fairtrade goods/LOAF food
- Research ethical banking
- Participate in other community activity with an eco-agenda
- Invest in a bike so I don't use my car for every journey
- **I hope Carey can develop its own recycling system and replace the existing commercial arrangement for our waste, all of which goes direct to landfill.
- I hope Carey can encourage its members and friends not to use single-use plastics and paper cups on our premises, but instead use our own plates, cups etc and to train people to use the dishwasher in the kitchen instead to cut down waste.
- I hope Carey can play a part in local environmental initiatives, like the event to encourage local afforestation, which we hope to invite Sir Mike Penning, MP along to.
- I hope Carey can install a bug hotel in our church garden and explore ways of making our church garden more welcoming to birds and local wildlife.
- I hope Carey can form an ongoing partnership with a local environmental organisation, so that as a church we can contribute to wider community events to support our environment.
- I hope that before COP26 in November next year, Carey will have become a bronze-level eco-church.
- One of my personal pledges for 2021 is to buy a more environmentally-friendly car.
- ***One might justify, for example, owning shares in an oil company if you know that that company is working very hard to innovate in green energy, realising that oil is a better feed-stock for other polymers than simply for burning.

The church might do better to continue to join with other churches in purchasing energy to get a low price than to pay more for eco-sourced energy supplies when finding it hard to pay for the costs of heating. Very few decisions on eco-friendly life are straightforward.

One should realise that Carey as a building is an environmental nightmare. We are not that good at recycling paper, we use disposable cups, paper towels etc. Covid-19 precautions have made this worse, also the amount of chlorine that goes down toilets to sewers...

****Walking to church — I have done this very occasionally on a Sunday, but mainly when there's been snow on the ground! In the past few months I've walked to the church sometimes when going to do photocopying — this has been a way of getting exercise.

Air travel – I have only travelled by air a few times anyway and rarely go abroad.

Recycling – Last year (2019) I did some research on ways to recycle various items locally – eg there's someone in Kings Langley who collects toothpaste tubes, brushes etc; used pens (biros, felt-tips etc) can be taken to somewhere in Harpenden – I haven't checked whether these collections have been affected by the pandemic, but will do.

**More generally – for people to recognise the inevitable connection between supporting the United Nation's global treaty banning nuclear weapons, and the need to protect our planet from all forms of human destruction.

***It is extremely difficult to get the true cost of possessing anything, in order to decide whether for example one should change a car for a less polluting and more efficient model. I have a 24mpg average 20 year-old car, but have just found that the CO2 generated in building a car is as much as the fuel used in its lifetime if, say 100000 miles. Mine is around 130000 currently, so it is probably worth getting the rust dealt with and hanging onto it. With my life-expectancy of five years, changing for a newer car doesn't add up. In fact it will be better to go to sharing one car with my wife, accepting that hers does 40mpg, and is 7 years old and assuming we can use a taxi if we need two cars simultaneously.

The same sort of issues come in in terms of whether one fits photovoltaics to the house (probably £20000) with no real idea of pay-back time or value added to the house.

Ground source energy is a possibility, but it involves digging up the garden and a total replacement of the central heating system to deal with the lower temperature of the heat. Again OK for the long-term, and to be encouraged for younger people than I am.

****I think we should consider how we can encourage all those using the Carey premises (not just the church congregation) to recycle and provide suitable containers. This will obviously mean one or more people taking responsibility for emptying them and taking the contents wherever necessary! We could have a series of Bible studies, possibly during Lent, using either the new York Course ('Caring for Creation') or 'Sustainable Faith: A green gospel for the age of climate change' by Nicola L Bull and Mark McAlister. Nicola Bull is (or was) a member of High St, Tring.
