But I could see a runner leaning on a tree. I felt a bit excited and wondered 'could it be that I could be a runner and do my little bit or should I just stay comfy and watch from where I sit?'

That day I took the challenge and started something new. I wonder, when I've done my bit can I pass it on to you?

### Re-opening face to face BB&GA

BB HQ has approved BB&GA companies to re-start face to face

meetings but with a lot of changes to manage the risk associated with the virus.

Different age groups now need to meet on different days so Anchors has moved to Tuesdays, from 5:45 to 7pm. Juniors is still on Fridays from 7pm to 8:15pm whilst Seniors will move to Sundays from 7pm to 8:15pm with the younger 14 plus encouraged to join them. Most of last year's 14 plus are older and are off to university and unfortunately there are not enough suitable evenings to have a separate meeting night for those that are still in Hemel.

The helpers and leaders for all age groups will be wearing face visors, which reduces the risk of virus transmission whilst still allowing the leaders to be seen and heard properly. The Seniors and younger 14 plus will be wearing their own face coverings. Games in the hall are being reinvented to work with everyone physically distanced by at least one metre whilst each member will have their own colouring pens etc so that they should not be sharing any items with anyone else. The age groups will be split into an older and younger group, where necessary, to limit each activity group to a maximum of 12 so that it is possible to respect the 1 metre distance in our relatively small hall and church. Door handles, chairs, tables, equipment etc will be cleaned before and after use to prevent the virus lingering on any surfaces. Hopefully we will still be able to have fun, whilst keeping safe!

# CAREY'S 40<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY

This month marks the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Carey Baptist Church. On Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> October 1980 the first services were held of the new church, formed from the union of Boxmoor Baptist Church and Marlowes Baptist Church and using the Marlowes premises. There was a Service of Commitment in the morning and a Service of Celebration in the afternoon, including Communion, both led by members of the Hemel Hempstead Ministerial Team. The preacher on both occasions was Rev Hugh Cross, a former member of the ministerial team, who in the afternoon based his sermon on the immortal words of William Carey: "Expect great things from God, attempt great things for God".

You can read in the article by Tine Thurlow below something of the history of the Boxmoor church, her memories of church life there from the 1950's and the decision to close the church and join with Marlowes. The formation of Carey was clearly a much more momentous step for the members and congregation of Boxmoor than it was for those at Marlowes. Those of us who were members of Marlowes have much vaguer memories of the whole process, although some of us remember the setting up of a number of representative groups to discuss various aspects of church life in the new church. Jennifer Haywood remembers a meeting at Hilda Reynolds' house to discuss the merger (or otherwise!) of the various women's groups. (The men's groups of the two churches had already joined together as the Baptist Men's Fellowhip.) Chris Nightingall recalls that the Boxmoor Boys' Brigade company (5<sup>th</sup> Hemel Hempstead), which only consisted of Anchor Boys and the Junior Section at that time, closed and joined with the Marlowes company. The company flag of the 5<sup>th</sup> was 'laid up' and stands with the other Brigade flags in the Carev sanctuary.

Members of both churches were asked to suggest names for the new church. The short list on which we voted included 'Carey' and 'Gade Valley' – the tongue-in-cheek suggestion of 'Marbox' was discounted! Tine writes about the Boxmoor connection to William Carey. The

Marlowes church had always been a strong supporter of the Baptist Missionary Society and one of its past ministers, Rev Colin Dawson, had been the minister of Lower Circular Road Baptist Church in Calcutta, Carey's Church, for 11 years.

### MEMORIES OF BOXMOOR BAPTIST CHURCH - OCTOBER 1980

It's never easy to say goodbye to the Church which you've attended since the age of 3, where you were baptised, married, dedicated your children, and saw your daughter baptised, but this is what happened when Boxmoor Baptist Church closed its doors for the last time in October 1980. Many people may not even be aware that there was a Baptist Church on the London Road, opposite the moor, between Stratford Way and Russell Place, which is now the site of a number of flats. However, the Church can still be seen in a painting by past Boxmoor member, the late Sid Johns, which hangs in Carey Church Lounge.

Boxmoor Baptist Church was founded in 1826 and was a Church with a great history. Among its founder members was missionary William Carey's sister, Ann Hobson, and their sister, Mary Carey, also later became a member. The sisters' gravestone was brought from Boxmoor and can be seen in Carey's front car park.

The 1950s saw a flourishing fellowship, with many young people being baptised. As the years passed, as people moved away and the congregation grew older, the maintenance of the Church fabric increased as the congregation decreased. By the late 1970's with a team ministry of three, serving four churches, it became evident that the best way forward would be for Boxmoor to close and merge with Marlowes Baptist Church to form a new church, which, after discussion, was to be named Carey.

And so it came about, after much prayerful consideration that on October 12<sup>th</sup> 1980 the final service was held at Boxmoor Baptist Church. There was a large congregation, many of whom were previous members who had travelled back especially for the occasion, and also there were a number of past and present ministers. We were grateful to our Marlowes Baptist friends who provided the afternoon tea, allowing Boxmoor folk to spend time with old friends.

As a congregation we were pleased to bring with us, the illuminated cross that now hangs in the church entrance at Carey, previously donated to Boxmoor Baptist by St Mary & St Joseph Catholic Church, and the Lectern Bible, donated by St Johns Church Boxmoor, on the occasion of the centenary of the church building in 1964. The sale of the Boxmoor site also enabled considerable refurbishment of the former Marlowes buildings, in particular the Memorial Hall and the kitchens.

Forty years on, Eileen (Huggett) and I are now the only regular worshippers from the Boxmoor congregation, but Fran Vickery, Gilly Thurlow, Lynn Whitton and Tricia Wilson (nee Ebdon) are still in contact with Carey, as is Tricia's brother, Les, who is now one of our regular visiting lay preachers.

Over the years we have witnessed the strengthening of the fellowship brought about by the merger of the two Churches, and pray that in the years to come Carey will continue to grow in fellowship and in its witness to the local community.

# **REBUILDING AND RENEWAL**

Carey recently donated about half of their World Development Fund for this year to the Embrace the Middle East appeal for Beirut, following the explosion in August. In their latest magazine the charity writes about how some of the money they have received has been spent.

'With hospitals under pressure from the Covid-19 pandemic, primary healthcare centres are the first door that the people of Beirut will knock on for help and support,' says Serop Ohanian, director of the Karagheusian Medical Centre in Bourj Hammoud. 'Unless we rebuild, it will not be possible for us to welcome the 4,500 vulnerable patients we would normally help in a year.'


The Karagheusian Centre serves the Beirut suburb of Bourj Hammoud, where the predominantly Armenian population has been joined by Syrian refugees in recent years. Many people live in poverty and the clinic provides healthcare free of charge. It is about 2km away from the site of the blast, and was badly damaged. Yet in an inspiring display of resilience and selflessness, the staff team immediately began sweeping up the broken glass and making the caved-in ceilings safe. They had patients who needed them; it was vital to get the centre back in action. Just two days after the explosion, they were able to treat 341 people, and by setting up mobile medical centres in vehicles parked in front of the damaged building, they have been able to continue with patient consultations ever since.


The centre asked for our help to get the clinic repaired and fully operational as soon as possible. Thanks to you – our community of generous supporters – we were able to send emergency funding straight away. For families struggling with unemployment, lockdown and now the destruction of their homes, a loss of healthcare would be hard to endure. This is why your donations are so important – they get to the heart of the situation and directly help Lebanese Christians to relieve their neighbours' suffering.

# MAKING SPACE FOR WHAT WILL BE

The following are extracts from an article by Lynn Green, General Secretary of BUGB, in the Autumn issue of the 'Baptists Together' magazine, which has the theme: 'Seeking to Listen - Listening to God, listening to each other'. ### "I am doing a new thing..."

Ever since I became General Secretary, I have sensed that God was saying to us as a movement that he was doing a new thing in and through us. The verses from Isaiah 43:18-19 have particularly resonated with me and many others. I also sensed that in order for God to be able to do a new thing among us we needed to make space for him to speak and act and, over the years, we have created Beacons of Prayer as we have waited on the Lord together.....

So, what is the Lord continuing to say to us through these verses now?

### "Do not dwell on the past..."

As the weeks and months have passed since the beginning of this global pandemic we have felt the loss of things that were precious and had largely been taken for granted. We experienced the shock of those first weeks in lockdown as nearly everything stopped, we stayed at home and our church buildings closed. As we approached the three month stage our hearts were crying out, "how long, Lord?" and we longed for an end to restrictions as we tried to get our heads around the fact that this pandemic wasn't going away anytime soon. When 'Independence Day' dawned, we quickly realised that our longing for greater freedom brought with it great responsibility as we ploughed through guidance notes and risk assessments, and we felt overwhelmed and out of our depth.

When we prayed for God to do a new thing, we didn't imagine it would be like this...

Yet these verses from Isaiah remind us that while we give thanks for the past and celebrate all that was precious, the Lord is encouraging us to leave the past behind and be willing to step into a new future. *'Forget the former things, do not dwell on the past...'...* 

### Now it springs up, do you not perceive it?

.... One thing that I have continually had to remind myself is that just because I am not in control does mean that God is not in control. Waiting. Attentiveness. Trust. Dependence. This is what growing in Christ looks like right now. And the passage from Isaiah emphasises this; it talks about *perceiving* what God is doing. *'See I am doing a new thing, now it springs up, do you not perceive it?'* That suggests to me that what God is doing is not necessarily obvious or predictable.

Having an attitude of waiting does not mean that we will do nothing, though! As we wait and listen we are also poised for obedient action and ready to follow where the Lord leads us.

### I am making a way...

Two things, in particular, have struck me about this season. Firstly, that we need to change our thinking away from a 'we've got to get through this' mentality. as if this is iust some sort of blip that we will get through and then revert to normal again. Things will never go back to how they were; the world has changed. I believe that the place we find ourselves in now is a transitional space, an inbetween place where we have left behind the former things and are venturing towards the new that we cannot yet see. This is not a space to 'get through' but a call from the Lord inviting us to dwell in the present moment with him, embracing all that is at the moment and perceiving what he is doing in this season.

My sense is that as we dwell in the present moment, and as we perceive what the Lord is doing and join him in that, we will find ourselves venturing towards that future that we so long for. Not in one mighty, clearly defined, leap from a to b, but as an unfolding adventure that will take us beyond what we can know and lead us into a future that we cannot yet imagine.

An image that God has been laying on my heart since the end of last year is that of setting our sails to catch the wind of God's Spirit. As individuals, as churches and as a movement. I believe that as we unfurl our sails and open ourselves in readiness for the wind of God's Spirit to lead us, we can trust that we will be taken wherever God wants us to go. God has promised, 'See I am doing a new thing...' The Lord leads and we follow and in every season, that is enough.
