Imagine you were booked on a family day out to an amusement park. Lots of excitement ahead of the day. But on the morning of your trip, you wake up with a start. You have just had a disturbing dream, which you struggle to remember exactly. But you do remember that it seemingly included a message from a late family member. A message which warned that if you went on this trip, there would be dire consequences for a member of your family.

This is what happened to me a few years ago, when our daughters were in their teens.

What would you do? No doubt, people would react differently to this unsettling dream. That morning, I shared the dream with Chris. We prayed about it and decided to go to Thorpe Park nevertheless. We believed that God wasn't in the dream, because it seemed designed to stir up fear.

There were still times that day that I felt anxious, as we queued for the rides. More anxious than usual! But we had a very enjoyable day, without any disasters.

Like anything, dreams need to be subjected to prayer and discernment. Always good to ask whether or not God is speaking to us. And to specifically ask what God is saying through our dreams.

The other Sunday at Carey, as I started a short sermon series on 'Joseph the dreamer', I asked people what dreams they already had for 2022. And if they didn't already have a dream, I encouraged them to ask God for a dream for the coming year. As you know, we all dream and need to dream. They help us to gain insight and understanding into our lives. But whether our dreams come to us when we are asleep or awake, we should always submit this aspect of our imaginations to our Creator God, who gave us our imaginations to use.

I encourage us all. Be dreamers for God, for the sake of our churches, for Hemel and for our world. Wherever we are, Belmont, Grovehill or Carey, we are called to dream of God's Kingdom being realised in us and among us.

#### TEARFUND AND CLIMATE CHANGE

In their recent email Tearfund encouraged us to continue to keep the momentum growing so that world leaders know we still stand with those most vulnerable to the climate crisis, and we still want a greener, fairer world. Christian climate scientist Katharine Hayhoe gave this excellent analogy for how our collective climate action can build momentum:

'Too often, we picture climate action as a giant boulder sitting at the bottom of an impossibly steep cliff with only a few hands on it. It isn't budging an inch, and if we add our hands, we think it won't make any difference... But when we look around us – when we actively go out and search for what companies, cities, schools, churches and more are doing – we realise that giant boulder's already at the top of the hill and it's already rolling down the hill in the right direction. It already has millions of hands on it. It's not going fast enough yet. But if we add ours, and encourage others to add theirs, it will go a little faster. As the IPCC says, every action matters, every choice matters. And as I say, our voice is the most powerful force we have – the catalyst to action!'

#### So what can we do in 2022? Here are some ideas to get started:

- Pray and keep praying.
- Contact your MP. (even if you have before)

- Keep talking about the climate crisis with friends, family, your small group, church and others.
- Make changes in your everyday lifestyle choices

# NEW YEAR IS OVER – IT'S TIME FOR NEW PLANET RESOLUTIONS

In the wake of COP26 last November it will be more than ever down to individuals to make a difference to the climate crisis, by making our own "New Planet" resolutions. The general consensus of attendees, including the delegation of my colleagues from Christian Aid, is that it was a largely wasted opportunity just at the very time when there is no time, to waste. So what can we do differently this year in response?

We may have all heard of the big differences we can make such as replacing our boilers with electric heat-pumps and buying electric cars, but they are big choices and not everyone can afford to make them. There are however so many small, low-cost changes we can make on a daily basis that will help as well.

A good starting point is to understand our current individual impact on CO2 emissions by completing a Carbon Footprint Calculator. Once we have identified areas for improvement, there are endless websites full of ideas to try, books and blogs to read, podcasts to listen to, petitions to sign and groups to link up with. The issues may seem overwhelming but it's great to feel we can all be part of the solution.

Whatever we do, whether it is swapping to energy-efficient light bulbs, buying more locally produced food, or choosing paperless bills, the time is now for making those changes - it's time for New Planet Resolutions.

#### **FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT**

21<sup>ST</sup> FFBRUARY-6<sup>TH</sup> MARCH


For two weeks each year at the end of February and start of March, thousands of individuals, companies and groups across the UK come together to share the stories of the people who grow our food and drinks, mine our gold and who grow the cotton in our clothes, people who are often exploited and underpaid.

Can you help us get the message out even louder this Fairtrade Fortnight? In 2022, our online Choose the World you Want Festival will return from 21 February to 6 March. Last year's festival saw campaigners, shoppers, students and businesses come together in a show of support for the farmers behind our food on the front line of the climate crisis. From online panels to bake-offs and coffee mornings over 50 virtual events took place as part of our virtual festival, with supporters sharing the power of Fairtrade and what needs to happen next to ensure farmers and workers are put front and centre of conversations on how to tackle the climate crisis. The COVID-19 pandemic has shown us more than ever how interconnected we are globally. This interconnection is at the very heart of the Fairtrade message and is where your role begins. You are part of the Fairtrade movement, and you have the power to drive long-term change, not only with your shopping choices but with your support in spreading the message.

Since last Fairtrade Fortnight we have seen the G7 and COP26 take place. Over 33,000 campaigners joined 1.8m Fairtrade farmers and workers in backing the Be Fair With Your Climate Promise challenge to world leaders at the UN COP26 summit. But frustration came as the wealthiest nations failed to recognise the urgent need to invest in farmer expertise by delaying their promised \$100bn annual funding to the most climate vulnerable countries until 2023. That isn't good enough.


COP26 may be over, but we need to make sure climate justice remains a top priority. For politicians, for business leaders, and for all of us. www.fairtrade.org.uk

#### LIFE AT THE EDGES



Praise God that the gospel is being shared in remote locations in Bangladesh.

Fragile communities abound across the fault lines of Bangladesh. But where the local Church has taken root in the margins of these communities, there are signs of thriving. BMS World Mission workers Louise and Peter Lynch help those who work on the edges, supporting church-based initiatives that are transforming communities.

Louise and Peter's visits to one village, Balapara, have particularly stayed with them. Life there is marked by constant threat: the Covid-19 pandemic, natural disasters, and a state that is increasingly discriminatory towards Christians. But, as Louise explains, light still reaches in: "The church is bringing good news because it's telling people about Jesus, and therefore they've got someone to pray to and someone to hope in, which replaces hopelessness and uncertainty. But it's worth emphasising that they're not expecting God to lift them out of their poverty."

God is at work in other ways. "Some of it is just supernaturally amazing, in that God appears in dreams to people and they ask us, "Who is this Jesus?" Peter says. "I've met him in my dream, and I want to know who I am now going to follow."

Louise and Peter experienced a church "full of vibrancy and life" on their last visit. "The church is full of people, and we had such a joyful day and a good time worshipping and training, and the people feel blessed and are so grateful."

The hope of flourishing communities is what keeps Christian leaders working in villages like Balapara going. "Their hope is really that for the young people in these communities in their journey into faith, that these moments of joy stick, that this will provide a sense of belonging to the church family." Joy at the margins produces more joy. And when it does, villages like Balapara grow and thrive.

#### HANGING BASKETS

(The first in an occasional series from Belmont Road)

"Do we have to live here, Dad?" asked my 8-year-old son. We were sat in the car as I showed the family where we were moving to, with my new job. Out of the window we could see boarded up houses – with people still living in them; glass on pavements and the road, shops with grills, Union flags draped from high rise balconies, decay and dishevelment all around. And the rain from grey skies adding to the sense of being in a strange, foreign land, one of struggle and despair. I was later to learn that in some of the ground floor flats, when it rained, sewage would seep through the floors and the damp on the walls would be enough for thick mould to grow. In such conditions, parents raised their children.

"No", I said, "we don't". "Phew!" Came the reply.

Much of the housing on the estate was only about 20 years old. It seems it had been hastily built as part of the 'slum clearance' of the terraced housing that preceded it. Now beyond repair, the deck-access maisonettes were earmarked for demolition again.

"Anyone would think we live in a (expletive deleted)" laughed one young person referring to yet another newspaper article denigrating the residents of the area for its poverty, deprivation, high crime rate and drug use.

Fast forward some six or seven years. The demolition and rebuild complete. People moved out and back in. Semi-detached houses with gardens replacing maisonettes. Tower blocks refurbished: warm, clean, safe, well lit. 'Community Safety' a priority.

Slowly, people of minority ethnic backgrounds moved in, and the area became multi, rather than mono cultural. People walked the streets where once they had lived behind closed and locked doors. College students from out of area walked across the estate rather than around it.

And there were hanging baskets outside front doors. Remarkably, no one stole or trashed them. People, it appeared, began to take pride in their surroundings. Behind the facades, much poverty and struggle remained but people began to think better of themselves and the area. The ground sighed with relief.

On the whole, when people are loved, they change how they feel about and treat themselves, others and their world. Ensuring everyone has a decent home to live in, is an act of love.

And as the bible says, 'Perfect love casts out fear.'

#### THIS MONTH 100 YEARS AGO

We continue our series about church life at Marlowes Baptist Church in the 1920's. This month we find a reference to an epidemic, but it is uncertain whether this was an extension of the' Spanish' flu pandemic which started in 1918 or not.

The prevailing epidemic has laid aside many of our workers and made the carrying on of the various departments difficult. Our friend Mr. Skerman has not been able to tackle the tasks for which he has for so long done with ability and devotion. His help is greatly missed in the Sunday School and Band of Hope, also in editing this magazine and auditing the Church accounts. We hope for his speedy recovery and complete recovery to health, and we shall be glad when all our friends are again fit for service.

#### The Churches and the Russian Famine

Few hearts in Marlowes can have failed to be deeply moved by the reports which have been reaching this country from Dr Nansen and other competent observers of the unspeakable horrors of the famine in the Volga region. Many have contributed to the relief work either in money or in clothing, so that Mr Parris has been able to remit to the Friends' Relief Committee about £12 and clothing to the estimated value of £20. But the utmost that we can do is fall short of the awful need, and the fund is still open. One or two other churches in the Borough have also funds for this purpose, but concern has been expressed that a central fund should be opened so that members of the public not directly in touch with those particular churches might be encouraged to contribute. At the United Meeting for prayer and conference on 22nd February, the idea was warmly welcomed and commended to the several churches there represented. Meanwhile, so far as Marlowes is concerned, Mr Parris will gladly continue to receive
