PRIVATE OR PUBLIC?

What do you talk about during after-morning-worship tea, coffee and (if you're lucky) cake?

My experience is that the subject matter discussed is frequently not anything to do with the challenge of the sermon or the difference a prayer has made, or even our faith journey in general. We may do this in house groups, I recognise, but not everyone goes to a house group.

We might say the service was "good" (I do get told that sometimes, thank you!). We may tell whoever wrote them that "your prayers were lovely" or that "I love singing" a particular song or hymn. Many of us seem to find it less easy to share what we think or feel God may be saying to us in these ways and at these times.

Am I right? If so, why is that? Why do some of us seem to find it so hard to talk about our faith? Even to and with fellow Christians? Is it that we are not sure God is saying anything? Or has our faith become privatised to such an extent that we can't talk naturally about it? Perhaps we are not sure where and when God makes a difference. We are out of practice. If that is the case, get a-practicing.

During the recent TV coverage following the death of Queen Elizabeth, one commentator said that the Queen had the ability to be public about her faith in a way that did not alienate the listener. The commentator

reflected that was remarkable when, "let's face it, talking about faith is such a turn off" (or something similar). Is that the problem? We fear being a turn off? Thankfully, the Queen was not described as, as often happens with someone in the public eye, 'a regular church goer.' She was given the right name for her actions, spoken words and beliefs. The Queen was a Christian. (Get over it.) With that came the recognition that her faith was alive, and the title 'Christian' speaks of a relationship with Christ.

Recently, the NHS settled out of court with a GP who had been disciplined for offering to pray with his patients. A separate probe by the General Medical Council had found he did so in a way that complied with their ethical guidance. The GP has, reportedly, been the target of secular groups and some within the NHS who seem to be deeply intolerant towards Christian beliefs. The cost of going public with his faith, maybe. Is it that which stops us?

What these two examples have in common is that they are both faith in action, but action with words. Public words. Words that describe and reveal an inner reality, a reality that enhances and enriches life and leads to life in all its fulness.

Let's talk about it.





'GOOD LAND' BMS WORLD MISSION HARVEST APPEAL

Belmont Road and Grovehill will be supporting this appeal at their Harvest Festivals this month – Belmont Road on 9th and Grovehill on 16th.

The name of the BMS Harvest appeal for 2022, *Good Land*, is inspired by Deuteronomy 8: 7-9 - *"For the Lord your God is bringing you into a good land — a land with brooks, streams, and deep springs gushing out into the valleys and hills"*

BISHNU'S STORY

Bishnu is 36 years old. He has four daughters and a grandson to support. Last year, he had to make the difficult decision to spend the money he'd saved up for his children's education on trying to treat his sick goats. It was too late. They died anyway.

Goats are Bishnu's livelihood. Without them, things were really difficult for his family.

Veterinary training and access to a breeding goat would help Bishnu make a more stable income, and keep his children in school.

ANITA'S STORY

Anita lives in Ghusel with her husband and their baby boy. She says that there is a big problem with drinking water in the community. As a result, people often get sick with diarrhoea. "This is due to unclean drinking water, right?" she asks.

The source of Ghusel's water is in another community, and it is not well protected. "They say there is open defecation there," Anita says. "There are houses near the water source, they wash clothes there and animals roam freely. So the water source is deteriorating and it's becoming polluted."

Anita wants every household to have access to clean water. By teaching the people of Ghusel how to manage their water safely and ensure it is clean before they drink it, we can help keep the community healthy and safe from disease.

TARA'S STORY

Tara moved to Ghusel village when she got married. While she grew up outside the village and had the opportunity to finish school, her husband and many others in the village did not.

Right now, Tara's children are little – just four and six years old – but she wants them to get a good education now, so that when they're older they will be able to stand on their own two feet. Tara would like her children to be able to have good jobs and earn a good wage so that they are able to save money and have enough to help their families when people get sick or need support.

A child-centred classroom with well-trained teachers for Ghusel's youngest pupils would enable children like Tara's to start their education well, giving them more opportunities than their parents had.

'TO WASH OR NOT TO WASH?' - AN IMPORTANT QUESTION

At Carey's September Church Meeting an important question was raised. I am glad it was raised, because it highlights the need for us all to get our heads around how Christians can be responsible stewards of God's creation. How can we 'put our hands to the plough' and both individually and corporately reduce our carbon footprint?

The specific question raised was about washing up after the 'Meals from Around the World' event. What was better for our environment: to wash up ceramic plates, or to use disposable, cardboard plates? It was suggested that, due to the hot water needed for washing up, combined with washing the T-towels afterwards, that this might not be the most eco-friendly approach. However, as was mentioned at the Church Meeting, some further questions need to be asked of the use of cardboard plates:

1) Was this cardboard from a sustainable source, or were trees being felled without considering the need for long-term re-planting?

2) How much energy was used to produce the cardboard plates?

3) How much diesel/petrol was used to transport the cardboard plates (from who-knows-where)?

4) How much diesel/petrol would be used to transport the waste to landfill? On one level, this all seems too much to have to think about, for such a mundane matter like this. Some things are very difficult to fully calculate. It is understandable if we prefer to make a quick judgement. However, this question highlights that too often consumers are kept in the dark or even mis-informed about the choices they are making. Consumers are forced into making rushed decisions about important matters of caring for God's creation.

On this occasion, with regard to our shared Anniversary meal on 16th October, the Church Meeting decided to continue using and washing up ceramic plates. This was partly due to the practical consideration that hot food was not suitable for cardboard plates. But the question was left open for future events, particularly where cold, finger-foods were on the menu.

I look forward to future one-to-one discussions, or as a group in the church kitchen or at another Church Meeting, when we can talk about these and similar important matters. As Carey is an Eco Church, it is good and vital that we exchange views and ideas about best practice in creation care. *'The earth is the LORD's and everything in it'...* Colin Cartwright
